#### **Opening and Introductions**

The purpose of today's meeting is for ComEd to present on mid-year portfolio rebalancing.

## **ComEd Mid-Year Portfolio Rebalancing**

Molly Lunn, ComEd

### Background:

- Throughout the year ComEd monitors program and program element performance to track progress toward meeting year-end budget and savings goals.
- We don't usually like to make many changes in the first half of the year, but do a middle of the year "deep dive" review.
- We identified one program that has an over 20% shift and wanted to bring it to the SAG per the Policy Manual.
  - Note: See program flexibility policy in Policy Manual Version 1.1.

#### Income Eligible (IE) 20% Shift:

• This IE shift resulted from third-party IE program elements now accounting for \$10.3 million versus \$6 million in the approved plan.

- Additionally, there is a strong demand for the IE Single Family and Multi-Family program elements. The change represents almost \$2 million over the Plan filing, but this is really good. We finally have broken through and getting penetration.
- Because the 2018 was a ramp-up year for the IE program, we want to accommodate these adjustments to make up for the average annual \$42 million stipulated goal, now forecasting a \$44 million program spend (20%+).
- Chris Neme: What does the \$42 million include?
  - Molly Lunn: The \$42 million includes all IE spend, but does not include overhead / administrative costs.
- Chris Neme: So this excludes spending on R&D?
  - o Molly Lunn: Yes.
- Facility assessments also has high demand. We are trying to pace this, as we know it
  does not directly have lots of savings, but builds a needed pipeline. This change
  represents \$800,000 higher than the Plan.

## Downward budget shifts:

- Education and Awareness Marketing program element (-\$500,000 or 10% cut).
- Research and Development (-\$1.7 million 13.3%), not cutting any projects just slowing down spend and work will be continued in 2020.
- Residential Product Rebate program element, due to strong demand, we have lowered the rebate from \$100 to \$75 and created an eligibility requirement of one smart thermostat per account. This went into effect at the beginning of July.
  - o Chris Neme: I would be interested to see if this changes program participation.
    - Molly Lunn: I can see if there is anything to share at the next SAG meeting.
- To clarify, no reduction in budget for Residential Product Rebate, only changing rebate offering for smart thermostat.

## Overview of Income Eligible Changes:

- Single family \$13.6 million (compared to \$11.6 million in Plan)
- Multifamily \$11.4 million (compared to \$8.3 million in Plan)
- Karen Lusson: Is IHWAP leveraging included in the amount mentioned?
  - Molly Lunn: Yes
- Karen Lusson: Has there been discussion about partnering with Nicor Gas on multifamily?
  - Molly Lunn: There has been discussion but not a partnership. Suggests reaching out to Nicor.
- Chris Neme: Interested in more detail about what budget is moving where to get a better understanding of where the uptick is.
  - o ComEd will provide a table that breaks down the original plan budget for income eligible programs, and the updated budget per mid-year portfolio shifting.

#### Other Questions:

- Jennifer Morris: Were there any changes to the demand response program?
  - Molly Lunn: I don't believe there were any changes; we are on track to meet the budget.
